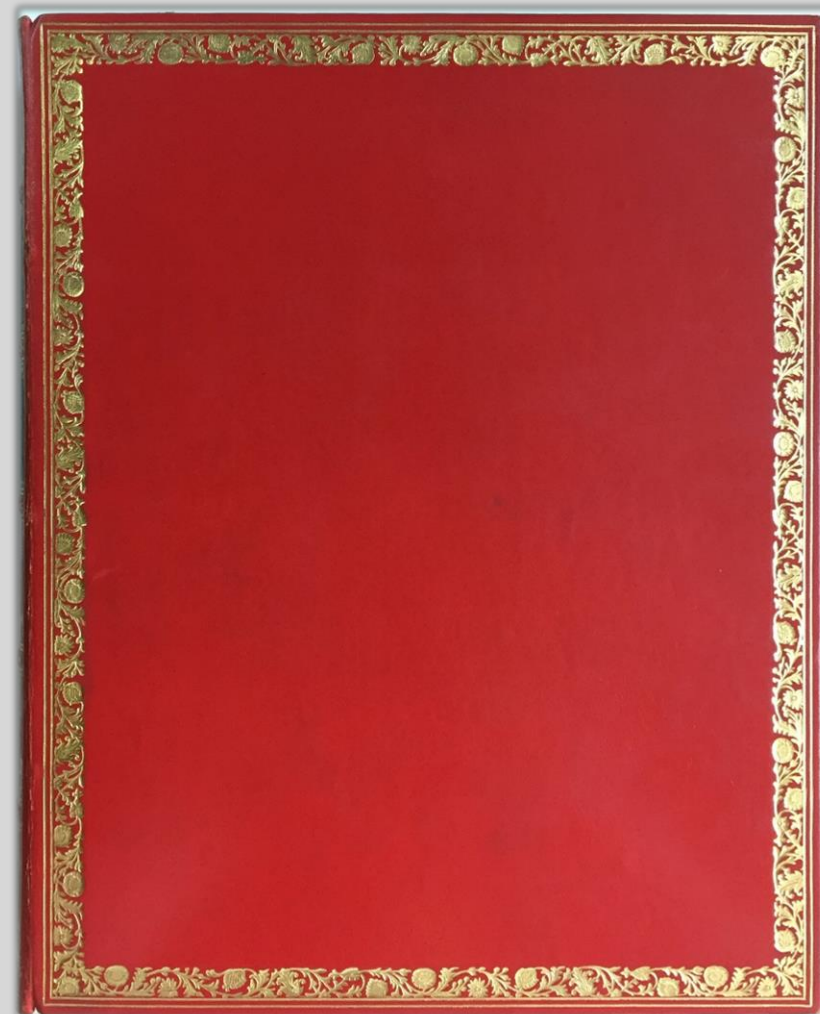
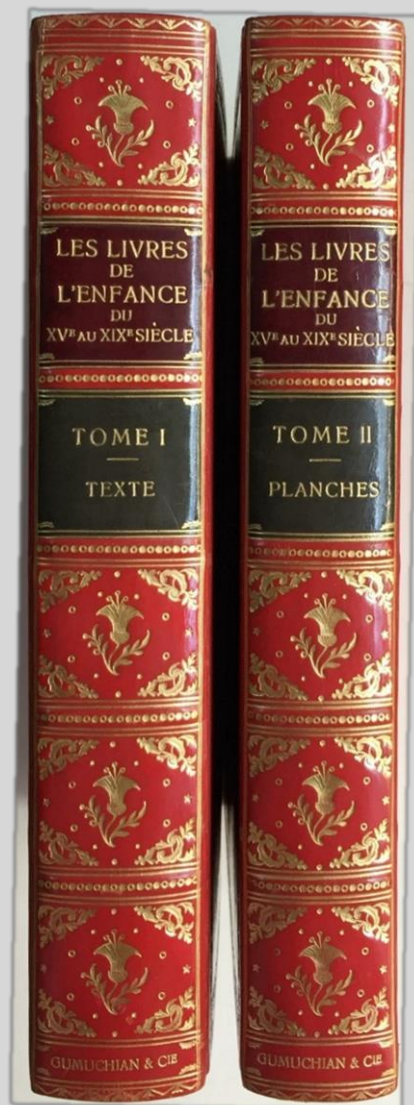
Sunday evening at 10:45 o'clock.

She found her parents, very well meaning, good people,

A shopkeeper was asked not to exhibit it in the window as it would certainly injure their custom... . The letter goes on further to explain the readers' disgust at the front cover and suggests various other 'charming' pictures that could have been used.

This illustration shows the Mower fitted with a narrow, smooth **Solid Iron Roller** following behind the Machine and 4 inches wider than the Cutting Cylinder. Intended specially for Bowling Greens and Putting Greens, to act as a turf smoothing iron, and where the use of a heavy roller is not needed or advisable.

The iron Roller is also a very valuable attachment for use on soft, spongy, mossy, or uneven lawns, and does not appreciably add to the labour of driving the Machine.

This illustration shows the Machine as it appears when **OUT OF GEAR** and in the proper position for running it over gravel walks or rough and uneven ground. When moving it in this way, there is no unnecessary wear of the driving pinions, all risk of damaging the cutting knives is avoided, and the Machine can be pushed over the ground with very little labour—a great advantage, especially on **GOLF LINKS**.
